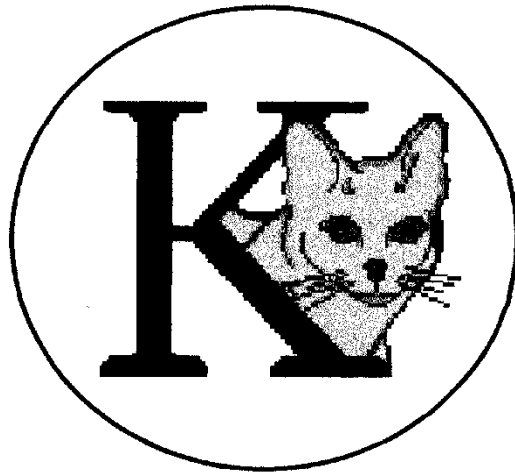

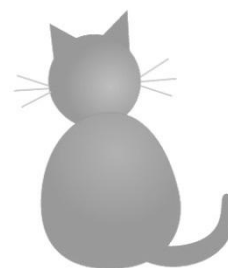

GCCF NEWS - SPRING 2026

COUNCIL FEBRUARY 2026

There was only a very brief mention of Korat & Thai business at Council. It was reported that there was a four-word addition (for clarification) to the atherosclerosis testing programme in our registration policy that had been approved by the Board and published on the electronic agenda.

Most of the other agenda items concerned individual breeds, possibly the longest list I've seen, and of course they are passed swiftly, as they are requested by the Breed Advisory Committees and scrutinised by Genetics Committee and the Board, but the meeting came alive on show matters. There was debate on judges doing the same classes at shows close to each other by date and area, and on exhibitors who moved cats between the pedigree breed and pedigree pet sections. Let's say it became clear a few delegates had some very strong feelings!

The other matter that many found interesting was the Chair's welfare report as the Government had recently published its animal welfare strategy. In the future there could be further restrictions on pedigree breeding and the sale of kittens, maybe even the banning of some breeds.

WORLD CAT CONGRESS

This is a meeting between the organisations who register cats and put on shows with 2026 being GCCF's turn to host. The magnificent city of Liverpool provided a super waterfront venue. As well as time for internal discussions, the event must offer a seminar and show, which gave a chance to explore the area. (Visiting Delegates had opted for a Beatles tour, a ferry ride and a fish chip and supper). There were plenty of appreciative comments, particularly for the amazing weather.

We had invited speakers who were experts in their fields for the seminar, mostly from the UK though with the addition of Prof Leslie Lyons from the University of Missouri well known for her work in feline genetics and the development of DNA testing. The Korat is one of her favourite breeds, because it presents such a good example of breeder cooperation within its genome. Although a minority breed (low registration) we have sound genetic diversity because of sharing lines internationally and maintaining a willingness to import from Thailand on occasions.

Prof Dan O'Neill (RVC, London) was perhaps the most controversial speaker. The Innate Health Assessment for dogs was put together from his research, and his aim is to create something similar for cats. The intention is that breeds with extreme conformation should be moderated for the sake of their health and welfare, by persuasion rather than breed bans, but something that all registries must now consider. It's good to report that our Korats and Thais, which have remained close in looks to the breed's foundation cats that arrived in the west over sixty years ago now, are amongst the majority of breeds that will not be affected.

THE SUPRME SHOW

Not a big turnout in exhibit numbers, but the quality was still there (impressing the overseas judges). The overall Supreme Exhibit was a Norwegian Forest Cat (MN) and there are lots of pictures of him and the Supreme Adult and Kitten on the GCCF website. There was just the one Korat, Nikelsilva Satin, a young boy just over a year old, shown as a kitten at Cheshire Area (owner Debbie Shakespeare, breeder Cathy Nichols).

Maia – Closing the Olympian Chapter By Clare Treacher

The last time I wrote about Maia we had had a great show weekend last August collecting Maia's third and fourth Olympian certificates and were looking forward to trying to get her last certificate before she officially retired. We didn't get to go to any more shows last year but in January we braved the weather and started again knowing time was starting to run out as I really wanted to have her spayed by late spring.



We attended two shows in January and one in February but no luck with Olympian certificates. We then attended The Surrey & Sussex Cat Association show in March where her granddaughter Cara joined her. The class was big as usual and although a good judge I didn't think she had much chance so off for breakfast we went and hoped Cara would possibly manage her second kitten certificate (which she did ☺). The show was on the STAR system so had live results. We saw online the Olympian results come up and some how she'd managed to get herself the Olympian certificate! It didn't quite sink in until I saw the slip on the board with Oly next to her pen number. It doesn't have the same feeling seeing it online to on the awards board!! I was so pleased

she'd done it! She had talked her way (quite likely!) into becoming an Olympian Bronze Imperial Grand Champion titled Korat. The day was great and so nice to have Julie there with me to see Maia become an Olympian. It was her cat Izzi who made history becoming the first neuter Korat to gain the highest Olympian title and having seen this thought maybe Maia could try to get the first level for an adult.

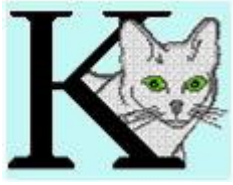
It took us two years five months from her first Olympian certificate, with two litters of kittens in the middle but the journey was so worth it. I'd like to thank her Olympian judges; Marlene Buckeridge, Di Brown, Shelagh Heavens, Sarah Johnson and John Harrison for thinking highly enough of her to award the Olympian certificates, we are very grateful.

Maia is now the second Korat to gain an Olympian title and the first adult Korat to get the title. Such an amazing achievement for her but also for the breed. Korats are a minority breed and to beat some of the more striking breeds in the Olympian classes is hard.

As you read this Maia is now officially retired as a breeding queen and champion show cat. She was spayed shortly after she won her qualifying certificate and is now enjoying retirement, not that that really looks that much different to her! She loved her kittens and was an amazing mum. After the initial dislike of Kaya's first litter at the end of last year, she settled well into being a granny and still loves Cara like her own. Hoping this will stick for future litters in the Saluay household. Maia will now spend some months away from shows before I'll try her at a show later in the year to see if she fancies any Premier titles.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

HELD ON SUNDAY 27TH APRIL 2025 VIA ZOOM

1. Chairman's Welcome

Julie Cherkas welcomed everyone, and the meeting began at 14.06.

Julie advised there was a minor amendment to the agenda to include the appointment of committee members as these were up for re-election and with no objections these were added to the agenda under point 11 d.

2. Apologies for absence

Apologies had been received from ten members: Caroline Bertram, Janet Williams, Janice Fentem, Helen and David Hawkins, Brian Lacey, Angela Adams, Clair Harding-Brown, Jane Couch and Judith Jewkes.

3. Minutes of the 2024 AGM held on 28th April 2024

The minutes were circulated to members in advance of the meeting. The minutes were accepted as read and signed off electronically. Proposed by Sarah Williams-Elliss and seconded by Felicity Black.

Dee joined the meeting at 14.10.

4. Matters Arising

None.

5. Chairman's Report

Lynda joined the meeting at 14:13.

The club had had another successful year especially for a small breed club. We ended 2024 with 74 members which was down from a few years ago. The club had amended the registration policy this year and this will be explained later in the meeting. One slightly disappointing part was our annual show made a slight loss again this year. We need a few more entries to be able to breakeven. It is mostly treated as a promotional event which costs the club a small amount of money. It made a loss of £270. With all prices going up we are likely to need to put entry fees up this year. Dee will cover more in her report. Looking at kitten registrations over the years, this year was quite concerning. In 2013, 93 kittens were registered but only 40 were registered last year. It's not surprising as we have lost a few breeders, but we need to make an effort to try to get more breeders on board. In 2021 51 Korats and 18 Thais were registered. Apart from that year we have had mid to high 40s registered since 2019. Thank you to everyone on the committee as you all do a great job and it is much appreciated as without the committee, we wouldn't have a club and even fewer breeders.

Shelagh and Kit were hoping to breed. Felicity mentioned we have less stud boys for people to go to now as they are often related to the newer generation. The stud boys we do have are also spread quite far around the country and not close distances for people to travel.

6. Secretary's report on the work of the committee

The committee have continued to meet a minimum of three times over the year by zoom to discuss club matters. We have been working on a few handouts that can be used at shows to promote the breed. One was used at the Supreme that was available to visitors to take that briefly gave details of history, temperament and living with a Korat or Thai, with pictures of each. We also had a new show exhibitor guide that will become available on the website soon for people interested in showing to download.

Dee and Julie have been doing a great job at producing the newsletter and back to 3 issues a year. I am sure everyone appreciates this.

Our show took place last year and had a much better turn out of cats compared to the previous year. We had 16 Korats and Thais and 5 Household Pets attending on the day. The show ran well thank you Ian,

Dee and also the committee for working hard to make sure exhibitors had a good day. Caroline did a good job with the raffle and increased ticket sales greatly from last year, possibly helped by the nice prizes we've had the last couple of years. Hopefully we can have an even better turn out this year. It would be nice to see over 20 Korats and Thais at our show to compete slightly with the number of Russian there.

The show licence for 2026 is awaiting GCCF board approval.

Thank you to the committee for the work they've done during the year, and I hope we have another good year this year.

Julie added that a show advert was going to be put into a few other show catalogues from July onwards. All the Korat and Thai exhibitors know about the show, but we may be able to increase Household Pet entries. The adverts are not particularly pricey at £10-15.

Jen also mentioned there is a GCCF show advertising package that was trialled last year and maybe worth looking into. It was agreed to discuss in the committee meeting.

7. The Hon Treasurer's report and financial statement

The accounts for 2024 were submitted in April and awaiting a response to confirm they have been signed off. The accounts are still healthy and in a good place financially.

The balances at the end of 2024 were:

Current account: £600.95

Savings account: £6257.50

Petty Cash: £277.00

Closing Balance for 2024: £7135.45

Loss for year: £97.22

Total members at end of 2024: 74 members

We have a very loyal membership which continues each year and a big thank you must go to all the members for supporting the club. We are very lucky as a club that we have many people coming back every year. So far this year we have 56 paid up members.

Expenditure for the 2024 show was £704.06 but the invoice wasn't received until after the 31st December 2024 so will be in the 2025 accounts. The figure that is currently in the 2024 accounts of £552.65 was for the shared show in 2023. We made a loss of £269.97 which was slightly less than the previous year.

Currently in the account:

Current account: £409.77

Savings account: £6278.25

Petty Cash: 277.00

Julie thanked Dee for all her work on the accounts, membership, newsletter and the website with George.

Jen asked about bank charges on the account. Dee advised we pay £4.25 per month on the account. We did have the BAC account open and paid £4.25 once for that and then all the money was transferred from that account to the current account. The only expenses now are from the current account. No charges have come out of the savings account, but this will be monitored in case they start charging. Lloyds removed the option to have a treasurers account and now have a community account which they have started charging for.

Shelagh mentioned a club she is treasurer for has a basic amount in the main account but the rest in the savings accounts as then the interest on the savings account helps to pay for the charges on the current account. The only bank that Shelagh knew does club accounts currently not charging is Natwest. Cheques are also often charged though we only have a couple a year and these are paid in on mobile banking and haven't seen charges for these. Many members pay by standing order. It was decided it would be good to keep a minimum amount, such as £100 in the current account and the rest transferred to the savings account. Dee would also look at the petty cash after the show each year and keep a minimum amount in there until the show the following year.

8. Appointment of a suitably qualified independent person to examine the accounts

Anne-Marie Enslin was happy to continue, and Dee was happy working with her. Proposed by Julie Cherkas and seconded by Louise Portsmouth.

9. The Show Secretary's report

There were 7 title changes this year, shown on page 17 of the newsletter. George sent congratulations to the owners of the cats. The rosettes would be ordered next week and sent out as soon as received. The show points scheme which was advertised better had a better response. The results were in the newsletter on page 18-19. The certificates were already printed and waiting to be signed and sent. George had tried to upload the latest show results onto the website, but it hadn't been possible so her and Dee would sort this as soon as they could. Julie congratulated Clare on winning breeder of the year.

Julie thanked George for her work on all the show results and titles.

10. GCCF Delegate's report

Overall council meetings were dominated by the judge training scheme, revisions to the training and how to implement. The BACs are now winding down on having bank accounts as payments are now going to GCCF. We do have to pay £30 to the GCCF but we get BAC/JPG meetings zoom covered, and there's also a judge bursary scheme for judges in training that allows up to £150 for having these judges at club shows.

Nathan Gilbert, Sue Dalton-Hobbs and Karen Kempself are our Junior Judges. In addition, we have two judges from the original scheme; Dorothy Stone has a re-training scheme set up for her and Kaye Wilson is now taking time out.

Kate Kaye is the secretary of the 4a Progression group, and the judges will be monitored on individual breeds but also on how well they can compare and contrast the breeds for tutorials and miscellaneous classes when competing against each other to get practice for grand classes in the future. It should make training quicker, but we do need new judges.

Writing of reports is putting some existing judges off making more frequent appearances and new ones from getting started but many exhibitors make the point that getting reports is a feature of GCCF shows and a reason why they go to them. The proposal to exempt judges from reports on additional cats on the day from absent judges was not approved.

The introduction of a Kitten Champion title was a positive addition, and some Korats are already gaining certificates. This was hoped to bring in more exhibitors. The Supreme is at its traditional time of year in October this year but then in 2026 its all change and the Supreme will move to April to combine with the World Cat Congress and be at a new venue in Liverpool. There may be remote access to the seminars on Saturday. The actual show is on the Sunday.

If a neuter of any breed is imported, no DNA testing is required if the neutering is validated by vet records and a microchip number. If a breeder accidentally or on purpose makes an outcross that isn't allowed for by the BAC and/or genetics committee, the offspring will all be XSH or XLH and always on the non-active register. Importers will need to declare blue eye colour (both or odd-eyed) if they aren't white cats, colourpointed cats or Himalayan cats to allow tracking of the Dominant Blue Eye genes (DBE). There is an upper age limit now for queens to be bred from which is 10 years old but needs board dispensation if the girl is over 8 years of age when the kittens are born. Council will possibly be considering something similar for studs, possibly with age extended to 10-12 years old.

Julie asked about DBE in odd eyed cats, which is possible. DBE has been seen in cats imported from Eastern Europe, British Shorthair and Sphynx, also Persian and Exotic. Maine Coon and Norwegian Forest breeders want to make sure they don't get it. Testing imports for Korats and Thais is roughly £70.

11. Elections

President & Vice-President

Judith Jewkes and Lynda Ashmore were happy to continue in their roles as President and Vice-President, respectively.

GCCF Delegate and Substitute delegate for council

Jen Lacey to continue as GCCF delegate and Sarah Williams-Elliss to continue as substitute delegate.

Committee members

Louise Portsmouth, George Terry, Felicity Black, Sarah Williams-Elliss and Caroline Bertram were happy to stand again and will be reappointment for 3 years.

In the electoral meeting that took place after the AGM last year Janet Williams was co-opted onto the committee so now will be appointed for 3 years.

The vote for elections was taken en bloc, proposed by Dee Hillier-Kidston seconded by Clare Treacher.

12. Registration Policy

The new registration policy was emailed to everyone. The main change was to remove the genetic register as it was no longer used. It was used for cats that had a possibility of GM but as we now know all GCCF registered cats are screened negative by ancestry it is not needed. We just need to make sure any imports are tested for GM. The second change was any imported cats with blue eyes are genetically tested for DBE to ensure they are clear as it isn't something we want in our gene pool. Once this has been checked it will go to council in June. Once approved it will then go on the GCCF website and the KTCA website.

There were no objections. Proposed by Julie Cherkas and seconded by Jen Lacey.

13. Items for discussion

a) Standard of Points – Scattered white hairs

There had been some discussion at committee meetings as to what is allowed as some judges withhold and some do not. Kit mentioned a bunch of white hairs is not allowed but the odd white hair shouldn't cause a problem. Lynda mentioned its subjective and scattered white hairs can be on the back of the neck and be mating marks and judges would evaluate. Shelagh mentioned it will be important to monitor new judges. It was decided to leave it as it is in the standard for now.

b) GM description on GCCF/KTCA website

Breeders were getting quite a few people asking about Gangliosidosis. It is not mentioned on our website. It is on Korat World so may be worth asking if we can use what they have. The GCCF website doesn't state it as a hereditary disease for Korats anymore. It is on laboratory websites, but unlikely new owners are checking on these pages. If we get new owners asking about GM we need to ask where they looked so we can make sure it has correct information and then educate new owners. During the meeting Jen found Pets4Homes had a piece on GM in Korats, so this was thought to be where people were finding out about GM and asking about cats being tested.

c) 2025 Charity recipient for club donation

Last year's recipients were SOS Stepping Stones Charity and were in the Newsletter. There were no suggestions of cat rescues people knew, so it was suggested to wait and see if something comes up during the year. If not, it could be donated to the CWT.

d) Newsletter

The newsletter was now back, and Julie thanked Dee for getting this going again and organising her to get it produced.

e) Website

Julie thanked George for all her work on the website over the year. George and Dee will discuss how to get things uploaded easier on there.

f) Facebook

Julie thanked Clare for all her work on Facebook over the year.

Julie had tried to use some photos from the Facebook page for the last newsletter, but none had names on for the post she was looking at. Clare suggested she could put a post up before the newsletter was due to get people to put their cats' photos up to use. They would need to be members to be able to go in the newsletter so may get some new members too.

14. Any Other Business

Felicity mentioned if it was worth being on the GCCF Breeder Scheme as she didn't feel she had had any enquiries that way, only from the KTCA website. Julie had had quite a few from being on the GCCF breeder scheme. Many people are also found from word of mouth. It was decided it was personal choice if a breeder wanted to be on the scheme.

Julie thanked everyone for attending and the meeting closed at 15:50.

Update on Sarah Williams-Elliss, 2025 Charity Donation and Cat Welfare

In our Summer 2025 Newsletter we brought you the very sad news that Sarah Williams-Elliss, a Korat and Thai breeder and Committee member, became ill last Autumn. Since then, Sarah has moved from a hospital to a rehab hospital and is now currently in a care home and is happy there. She has made good progress towards recovery and is still determined to improve further.

Sarah is not able to keep her cats and therefore she was supported to start rehoming them three months ago. There were several Korats and Thai Blue Points, the majority of which have been returned to breeders or adopted by other breeders. All the Korat and Thai cats are now in their new homes.

Four Korats including two kittens were to be rehomed directly from the cattery, so KTCA agreed to fund their neutering costs to quicken their adoption and has recently paid £414.74 direct to the vets. This amount will be treated as a welfare donation from Club funds. The owners of two of the kittens adopted have sent a photo of them in their new home. Sarah will be grateful for the contribution, as she faces some quite large boarding and vet bills in addition to her own care costs.



The cattery that has boarded the cats also run a rescue. They have used their skills to work with the cats to improve their confidence and inputting additional time and love into enabling the cats to be ready to go to new homes. The Korat kittens were born after Sarah became ill and were raised by the cattery including bottle feeding as their mum was unwell. They are lovely friendly kittens and are very much loved by their new families.

In addition to the significant input of time, the rescue has also used their own resources to purchase lots of extra bedding for the sudden influx of quite a number of cats. Some of which were sent away with the cats going to new homes. The cattery had to purchase enzyme cleaners due to housing entire males in some of their boarding pens. The cattery staff also helped find some of the new homes and a few of Sarah's cats will stay with them at their own expense in the future. The rescue will continue to assess if any can be rehomed at a later date.

KTCA has chosen them as their charity of the year and the donation to the rescue will help to replenish their funds. If anyone would like to make a personal donation towards the cost of all the efforts made by the cattery, please get in touch with either Julie or Dee for details of how to make a transfer.

KTCA would also like to thank Donna Johnson, a friend of Sarah's who took on the mammoth task of rehoming all of the cats.

Finally, Sarah enjoys contact with her friends and would love to get a card or WhatsApp message from friends, if you have time to send one. An Abbreviated History of the Korat and Thai
First imported into the UK in 1972, the Korat (Si-Sawat) is the blue cat of Thailand. It is known by the name of its geographical origin, the Korat region in the north-eastern plateau of Thailand. Its Thai name defines the colour, 'Si-Sawat' meaning greyish-blue, the hue of the Sawat seed.

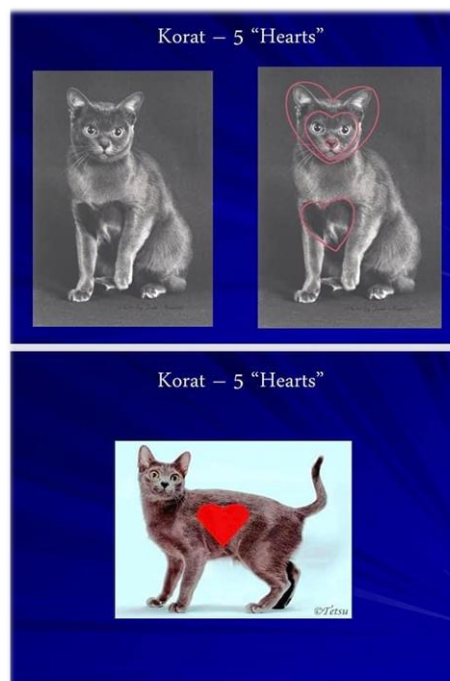


Korats and Thais have identical Standard of Points, but the Thais' coat colour and/or pattern varies due to recessive genes which may lie dormant in the Korat for many generations if only a single copy is carried. These genes occasionally come together to either alter the colour of the coat in the case of the Thai Lilac, (first appearing in 1989), or 'restrict' the coat pattern to a pointed (Siamese-type) coat in the case of the Thai Blue Point. The Thai Lilac Point has two copies of both coat colour and coat pattern genes to change the colour *and* pattern.



All Korat and Thai cats in the West today can have their ancestry traced back to imports from Thailand.

The Korat is an ancient breed that was described in the "Tamra Maew", a book, now found in the Bangkok National Library, written between 1350 and 1767. Its coat is short and blue with silver tipping. The Korat, with its huge eyes and loud voice, is also called the cat with the 5 Hearts: The cat's heart, the shape of its chest fur, the nose leather, the face, and the top of the head. Their eye colour is described as the green you see in the dewdrops on a lotus leaf.



Temperament/Behaviour

Affectionate, playful, intelligent and loving, Korat and Thai cats thrive on human attention and can be very insistent! They are true companions and are very interactive, such that there has to be a reciprocal commitment on the part of the owner. This breed likes to live in three dimensions! If possible, make sure they have a climbing post, a secure outdoor space and plenty of toys and games for mental stimulation.

Care/Grooming

Avoid overfeeding! Regularly clip claws. A soft brush or a rub down with a chamois leather or an old silk scarf will keep the coat in top condition.

Health

They are generally a long-lived breed, many reaching their late teens/early twenties. They were the first breed to use DNA screening, initially in the 1990s for Gangliosidosis; a genetic disease which has 2 forms GM1 & GM2, normally fatal before the first birthday. All UK lines registered with GCCF have been tested and have been found to be clear for GM. More recently, DNA screening for atherosclerosis (ATH) began in June 2025. Breeders have started screening for ATH and are working towards clearing all breeding lines within the next few years. Meanwhile, careful breeding will ensure no affected cats are produced whilst still maintaining genetic diversity. All imports are tested for both GM & ATH prior to registration with GCCF.

Showing your Korat and Thai

The Korat and Thai Cat Association hold a show each year, usually in early October, sharing a venue with the Russian Blue Breeders Association.

Our most titled Korat is Izzi (right), lovingly bred and owned by Julie Cherkas, officially known as Imperial Grand Champion and Olympian Gold Imperial Grand Premier, Jusarka Thai Lilac Promise!



What are they like to own?

Korats and Thais are not just a stunningly, good-looking breed, they are intelligent, affectionate, bright cats who are quick to vocalise their opinion on whatever is happening to them and their household. They can be very possessive over their human companions and need to be involved in everything.

Korats and Thais are loving, and given the chance, you will never sleep alone again, nor be able to visit the bathroom on your own either! They like to 'observe' from high perches. An active breed, they enjoy playing with their owners, being set puzzles to work out for treats, and some go to bed with their favourite toys!

The Story of Little Miss Mauve

It was a bright sunny Saturday morning when I got into my little red car and prepared to spend the day driving from the Midlands to a city in which I had never driven before by myself. Brave, foolhardy or something else?

By the end of the day, I would have driven a total of 278.7 miles, with the final 140 of which I was accompanied by an extremely vocal and *very* opinionated passenger.

To understand why, you need to rewind to the end of February, when I was trying to decide how I wanted to spend my birthday. Usually, I spend my birthday on my own, as my husband is working. This year, he decided to take the day off so that we could do something together. But what? And then I remembered. My friend lives close to a very nice pub, and we could all have lunch there to celebrate my birthday. Plus, she had a litter of five Korat kittens born just before Christmas, and I love kittens, especially Korat kittens. We were not planning on looking with a view to adoption. We already have two wonderful Korat cats, who are very happy with us and with whom we are very happy. But who can resist playing with a gang of 11-week-old kittens? Especially as a birthday treat!

We travelled down by train and took the Underground to the nearest station and walked up the hill. Five little faces looked at us, and we looked back at five little faces. All of them beautiful, and lively, and utterly gorgeous. Champagne was opened and poured, my birthday was toasted, kittens were played with, and off we went for lunch. More kitten-worship happened when we returned for coffee.

All of them were lovely, but there was one...there is always one...who was a bit special. But we were not looking for a kitten, and four of this litter were already chosen. And I am firmly of the opinion that kittens do best

in pairs, and I am also of the opinion that I like male cats best because they are soppy. The fifth kitten was female, and her breeder was in favour of keeping her anyway, because she has an impeccable pedigree and if she were to have kittens of her own, they might be rather nice. (All Korat kittens are rather nice! I know this because I have had a number of Korats over the years, 6 of them from the kitten stage...)

And so we returned home to Bob and Sparky, and gave them lots of love and a few treats, and we told them that they were the most special cats in the known universe. They yawned and said "Yes, we know that."

A few weeks passed, and Paul and I were talking, and he said "If Little Miss Mauve *is* looking for a home, she could come here..." So, I called our friend and relayed what he had said. Little Miss Mauve was not looking for a home. She already had a home.

On Tuesday of last week, the phone rang. It was our friend, who often rings for a chat, about cats, and music, and the things we are both interested in. And she said "I have been thinking. Are you still interested in offering Little Miss Mauve a home as neuter female?"

Of course we were. And it was arranged. Paul was not available on Saturday owing to other commitments. If we wanted her sooner rather than later (bearing in mind that she was 18 weeks old by that point) I would have to collect her by car. I don't think it kind to subject a kitten to the noise and rush of travel by tube and train, to say nothing of the potential for an overcrowded railway carriage. It is one thing for me to stand for 90 mins, quite another for me plus a cat carrier to do the same.

And so it was. After a very uncomplicated journey I arrived, found a parking space, and rang the doorbell. After some play time with the (by now on her own) Little Miss Mauve, my friend and I went for lunch, returned for a cup of tea, and then the kit and her caboodle were packed into my carrier and fastened on the passenger seat of my car ready for the return journey.

It would be fair to say that Little Miss Mauve had some rather strong Opinions about this, which she made very clear as we travelled up the M1 & M6 towards the Midlands. While travelling through London, she informed me that she had not agreed to leaving home, and that she wanted to go back, please. By Hendon (where there is a Police

College) she was yelling that she had been Kidnapped and needed Rescue. By the time we were on the motorway, she was calling me every rude word she had ever learnt. I spoke to her. I sang to her (I trained as an opera singer, so the “Cat Duet” by Giacomo Rossini was the obvious choice). She listened to that, and then she sang it back to me. I told her about every county we travelled through. By Coventry, she had tired herself out and the rest of the journey was quiet...

We arrived home, the carrier was carried through the house and into the spare bedroom, set up for her every convenience with toys, beds, water dish, inactivated Sure Feed feeder, litter tray, sunny windowsill. The carrier was placed on the spare bed, the door was opened, and Liane walked straight out of the carrier and straight into the hearts of her new human staff.

Sparky and Bob were...horrified.

Everyone was hissy and grumbly every time they caught sight of each other. The boys were still ok with each other, and she is a happy soul, with plenty to do and see in her new home. But she hissed at them, and they hissed at her. None of this was at all unexpected, and so the process of Cat Integration began.

I had both a Pet Remedy diffuser and a Feliway Optimum diffuser plugged in adjacent to the door of the spare room on the landing. The boys pass these every single day, every time they walk along the landing.

Paul gave the boys lots of fuss and attention, while I did the same for Liane. We did lots of “scent swapping”, and lots of playing with toys in the same place. I have been sleeping in the spare room with her, while Paul has been sleeping in our bed with the boys. She likes to get into bed and has a preference for sleeping by my feet under the duvet.

We have now had her with us for 7 days, and everyone is getting along so much better than I could have hoped. This afternoon’s play session involved a “Cat Dancer” toy, which I know the boys love, and which she loves too. It is a long piece of claw friendly fleecy fabric on the end of a plastic stick. There were no hisses, no grumbles and no bad language from anyone. They can be quite close to each other without any issues. Indeed, she walked past Sparky yesterday, and he sniffed her bum as she passed, which is a thing that both boys do to each other every day. Importantly, he did not hiss or growl. I have great hopes that, in time, they will all settle into a state of ease where they will all snuggle up together.

In 7 days, Liane has learned a lot of things, including how her Sure Feed feeder works (it’s programmed to her microchip and will only open for her, much to the annoyance of the boys, who quite fancy a spot of kitten food), and that there are lots of sunny windowsills in this house. She has learned that food comes from the kitchen (and that she is still having hers upstairs), and she has learned where the large main litter tray is kept and she has used it several times. She has visited the vet to be registered and to discuss the matter of her operation in due course. And she has learned that she can chase a Big Cat, and that a Big Cat will chase her right back, which is even more fun if she does it along the landing because she can hide in the cat tunnel and ambush a Big Cat as he walks past.

In due course, I will take her to a cat show, along with Bob, who is hoping to be placed in some Imperial classes. (Well, he isn’t, but I’m hoping he will be...) If she tolerates being shown, she will be seen on the Show bench. I am a member of a “Clergy with Cats” group on Facebook, and she already has followers around the world. Irrespective of whether she is shown or not, she is a beautiful kitten who shows great promise of being a wonderful cat, and I am very privileged to be her Human Person.
