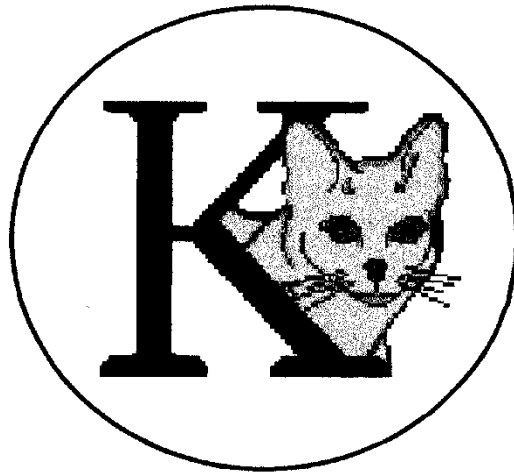

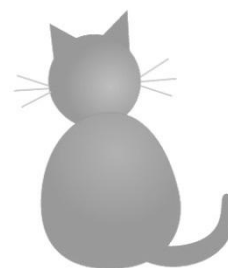

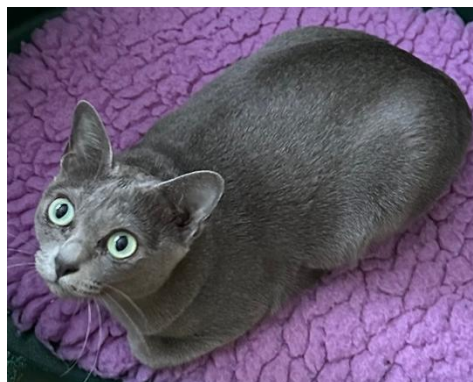

We are almost there and will soon be able to publish our findings and advise accordingly.

Committee News

I hope you have all had a lovely summer. We have certainly had good weather for a lot of it, if not a bit too warm at times, especially in London! The cats and I have been busy looking after Maia's kittens. These have all gone to their new homes now and peace has been restored.....for a few months anyway! I also recently got a Catio! I have wanted one for the cats for some time and the cats, especially Kaya, love it. It needs more interior design but it's a lovely little area to sit outside with the cats.



What's been going on with the club:

Our AGM was held in April on Zoom and had a good attendance. Attendees were able to find out what had been happening during the year with the club and with the GCCF. George presented the winners of the Show Points Scheme and new title winners. The winners' certificates and title rosettes were sent out when received after the meeting.

We welcomed Louise Portsmouth as our new Chairperson and Julie Cherkas as our new Vice Chair. We thank our previous Chair and Vice Chair, Julie Cherkas and Jen Lacey for all their hard work. They aren't going anywhere, just changing roles slightly. The remaining officers were unchanged for the forthcoming year.

The updated Korat and Thai Registration Policy was approved at the June council meeting. This included the removal of the DNA testing scheme for GM as all GCCF lines are clear. GM DNA testing is now only required for imports.

A new genetic disease has been found in Korats. Some Korats and Thais have been found to carry a recessive gene for Atherosclerosis. A DNA test is now available, and the club have been working with breeders to make sure all current GCCF registered breeding Korats and Thais are being tested as well as some retired cats to check as many lines as possible. This will ensure no kittens in the future will be born with the risk of getting Atherosclerosis. This does not mean every Korat or Thai will be affected, it is incredibly rare. Some cats that may be at risk have been identified and informed already. We are still in the early stages of identification and learning about the disease process, we will continue to gather information and put further information in a future newsletter.

Here's what's coming up in the coming months:

KTCA Show 2025

Our annual show is to be held at Bugbrooke Community Centre in Northamptonshire on Saturday 4th October 2025. The show entries are now closed and if you have entered, we look forward to welcoming you and your cats. It's not just for people who exhibit their cats, it's a great afternoon out for everyone. The show hall is shared with the Russian Blue Breeders Association show. Take the opportunity to see lots of beautiful Korats, Thais and Russians all together under one roof. The show is open to the public from 12:30pm.

Supreme Cat Show 2025

The Supreme schedule is out and entries close on Sunday 21st September 2025. We are hoping to have a few cats representing the breed in competition. The Supreme will be held at NAEC, Stoneleigh Park, Warwickshire CV8 2LZ on Saturday 18th October 2025. The theme for this year's Supreme is 'Tis the reason to be Jolly' so there should be some great decorated pens. It is a great day out for all the family so if you fancy seeing hundreds of cats, learning about multiple different breeds and spending lots of money in the retail hall, put the date in your diary!

If anyone has any concerns regarding the new genetic disease, please do get in contact with me (email on page 5) and I will try to answer any questions with the knowledge we have so far. I will need your cat's pedigree to be able to see their parents.

GCCF NEWS SUMMER 2025

Two faces very familiar to Korat exhibitors were elected as President and Vice President of GCCF in June as both John and Helen have judged Korats and Thais for many years, and both trained with the Korat & Thai BAC



GCCF President John Hansson

John must be the most well-known person in GCCF, both here and around the world. He's an all-breed judge who has officiated at shows across the country and internationally, promoting and presenting the Supreme on numerous occasions – very much the showman. He bred Siamese under his Pannaduloo prefix, and has always been particularly passionate for Section 6, but his knowledge and expertise with handling cats generally is widely respected, leading two periods as GCCF Chair and serving on the Board and other committees for many years.

GCCF Vice President Helen Marriott-Power

Helen ran John close for President and was a popular choice as VP. Another all-breed judge and past Chair of GCCF, Helen is also very well known for breeding and exhibiting some outstanding Rumba Burmese. She continues to judge frequently and can be met at shows all around the UK.



THE KORAT & THAI REGISTRATION POLICY



This had the changes described in the February Newsletter. We were able to remove the DNA testing scheme from our policy as all GCCF lines were confirmed clear. In future GM testing, it's only imported cats that will need testing.

However, there are more changes planned as the BAC is adding an atherosclerosis testing scheme with the intention of clearing the breed of this new genetic problem in the same way we tackled the GMs.

The most interesting discussion this time was to gauge feeling on introducing an **age limit for studs**. This had been suggested in October 2024 when ages were set for registering litters from queens. The delegates who had asked for this to make a return to Council did point out that breeders should be encouraged to neuter young and replace males rather than seeing stud life as a long-term option.

However, there was some fierce defence for the boys in their teens. It was thought they could add genetic diversity, and there should be no automatic association with welfare risk. In fact, as it was difficult to rehome older cats and they would not easily adapt to pet life; there should be no pressure on breeders to make changes in respect of older males. The conclusion was that breeders should decide (2-1 in favour), and that stud owners should be educated into providing suitable conditions for their boys rather than coerced by rules.

The Scientific Cat Laws

The last time I wrote about Maia she had just won her UK title at last year's Supreme Cat Show and was heading off on maternity leave. Maia had three beautiful boys in March and has been enjoying looking after her kittens, which will be her last. I haven't told Maia this yet but hopefully she'll enjoy being a granny instead!



Maia had halted her show career in January with two Olympian certificates, well 4 really but as these were from the recent breed show win, they didn't count as she already had one from the year before, and only one breed show Olympian certificate counts at each level. Olympians are hard to get, with stiff competition at every show, so I decided to have a little night away with Maia and try a double show further afield.

Maia and I headed to Hampshire one warm Friday afternoon on the train. As always Maia was a dream to travel with and caught up on beauty sleep on the way down. The hotel was well appointed right opposite the train station at Eastleigh which made for a quick check in. Once in the room Maia was ready to get out and explore. We had a nice quiet night watching TV, eating take away and having cuddles, something Maia loved away from her kittens (who were now more mini adults than kittens!).

No rushing around the next morning like usual on show days as the hall was 5 minutes in the car from the hotel. We arrived at the Wessex and Three Counties Cat show. Vetting in was rather slow but Maia surprisingly wasn't fazed, vetting in is usually her least favourite part. Off we went to find her pen and settle her in for the day. She hopped in the pen like she'd never been away. Good start so far. 10am came round quickly and all exhibitors were asked to leave. Time for breakfast and to check Maia's competition. I had entered her in one show fully and then just the Olympian class in the other show as it was her first show for 8 months. Seeing the huge classes (8 and 9) for Olympian made me think, well at least Maia is happy and I'm having a nice weekend away so doesn't matter if we don't place, there's always next time.

Breakfast and a cat chat for a few hours and then back to the show hall to see how we were getting on. Off to the award boards and one of the Olympian slips looked to be up...Three Counties... I had to look at the slip so many times, was it really Maia's pen number that had OLY next to it, surely not with all those cats in the class! I checked

another few times before texting Julie with a picture of the slip just in case I was reading it wrong to say Maia got one! That was Maia's 3rd Olympian Certificate, thanks to Mrs Sarah Johnson. The Olympian slip in the Wessex show took longer to come back, but in the meantime, Maia got a Best of Breed (BOB). The second Olympian class was up and again I had to double and triple check, Maia had OLY next to her pen number again! How is that possible, especially for a minority breed like the Korat. Maia had her 4th Olympian certificate thanks to Mrs Shelagh Heavens. To say I was over the moon, was an understatement! We could now go back to our cats, and I congratulated Maia on being such a clever girl and of course gave her treats. She seemed very happy with herself!



I spent the next few hours with Maia, taking photos, looking around all the cats and shopping for presents for Maia. Later in the afternoon a lot of the classes had been judged, just a few miscellaneous classes to finish off before the best of variety judges started looking at the BOB winners. To my surprise (again) Maia had a beautiful big gold rosette added to her pen, she had only gone and got herself Best of Variety (BOV) Section 4 Adult in the Wessex show. I was chuffed, especially with the rosette!

Maia has had a few BOV placings, and I always get nervous waiting for the overall section as although highly unlikely she'd get overall BOV, there is a 1 in 3 chance! The show manager read out the BOV placings over loudspeaker and she did it; "Overall Section 4 goes to the adult in pen 111!" Another pretty rosette awaits us at the top pen, plus some goodies.

I settle Maia into the top Best in Show pen, and she seems ok with this move away from her safe pen she's had all day. The overall Best in Show judge went along the line up of the top 6 cats in show and took them all out to be assessed. The overall Best in Show went to a beautiful Asian, who also won the other show too!



It was now time to pack up and start the long journey back to London. What a fabulous day we had. Maia slept after all her hard work and I looked back at photos of the day, still not quite believing Maia had won both Olympian certificates, Best of Breed, BOV S4 Adult and BOV S4 and best of all she did it with some of our Korat and Thai friends around.

Your Cat's Tongue

Why is your Cat's Tongue Rough?

The tongue of a cat has tiny, backward-facing barbs (papillae) on it and they're the things that create that rough sensation. The barbs serve several important functions. They make it easier for a cat to rasp the meat from the bones of his prey. The barbs also aid in grooming as they collect dirt, debris and loose hair from the cat's coat. The downside to the backward-facing barbs though is that anything the cat collects on the tongue will usually end up getting swallowed and that's how your cat may end up with lots of hairballs. The barbs on the tongue also make it dangerous should your cat get some yarn, string or tinsel in its mouth because it won't be able to spit it out!

Drinking Water

It used to be that experts thought the cat laps up water by curling the tip of the tongue into a makeshift spoon, but recent research has shown that the cat actually drinks by curling the upper side of the tongue downward and then darts it across the surface of the water at a remarkably fast speed. This causes a column of water to rise up, and the cat closes his mouth just in time to collect it before gravity allows the water to fall back down. This research was done by a group from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Virginia Polytechnic Institute and Princeton.

Grooming

For Survival - After a cat has eaten his prey, he will groom to remove all traces. This is an important survival strategy because he doesn't want to alert any other prey in the area to his presence. Additionally, a cat is small enough so he is not only a predator but potential prey as well. Removing traces of a fresh kill would be very important to his own safety as well.

For Comfort - Your cat will also use his tongue to groom himself to help keep cool, through evaporation.

For Behaviour - Grooming is also a displacement behavior and your cat may use his tongue to groom areas of his body if he feels stressed or anxious. Repeated grooming in the same area can actually cause bald patches. A cat will also use his tongue for social grooming. You may notice this if you have a multi-cat environment and you see two cats engaging in mutual grooming.

Taste Buds

A cat's tongue isn't very good at discerning flavours because it doesn't have many taste buds. In fact, it's largely insensitive to salt and sugar. Instead, cats seem to be attracted to the texture of particular foods on their tongues. Cats aren't fond of extremes, especially when it comes to their food. Overall, they tend to prefer foods at room temperature, and they use their tongues to test whether food is too hot, too cold, or just right.

Kittens Suckle

As kittens, the little prickles on the tongue help them latch on when they are suckling, again the papillae act as traction on the tongue, helping them hang on easier.



BUT The Best thing about your Cat's Tongue

Of all the things cats use their tongues for, showing affection is the one that has the most positive effect on their owners. Kittens learn about licking from their mamas, who lick them as they care for them. When your cat licks you, he's showing you he cares for you, and this is a generous expression since many felines tend to be somewhat aloof. Remember that and realize how lucky you are the next time you feel that rough tongue bathing the back of your hand!

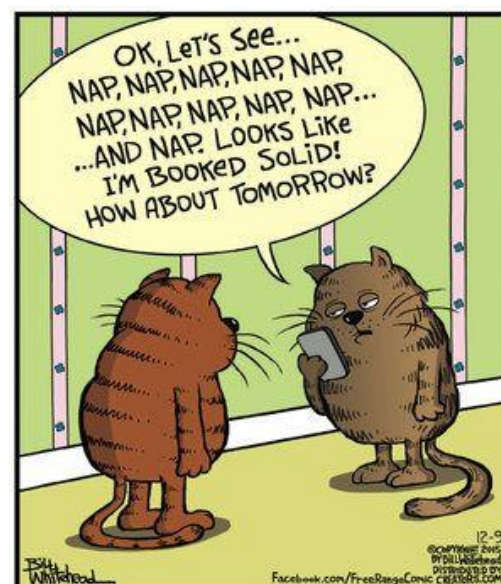
